Accredited Estate Planner® Designation (AEP®)

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Estate Planners & Councils

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The National Association of Estate Planners & Councils (NAEPC) cultivates the skills of each of its recognized disciplines in order to better serve the public's need for estate planning.

The AEP® designation is available to credentialed professionals within each of the following disciplines:

- Accounting (CPA)
- Insurance & Financial Planning (CLU®/ChFC®/CFP®/CFA/CPWA®/MSFS/MST)
- Law (JD)
- Philanthropy (CAP®/CSPG)
- Trust Services (CTFA)

The program is overseen by a committee of active designees who reflect the focus and expertise of each of the five disciplines. This body is responsible for determining eligibility requirements and ensuring that designation holders continue to maintain the necessary knowledge, skill, experience, and ethical standards.

Requirements



The NAEPC requires high standards for eligibility.

All applicants and designees must meet and maintain all of the following components:

Credential ·

An AEP® must be actively licensed or certified as an attorney; accountant; insurance and financial planner; philanthropic advisor; or trust officer.

Concentration ·

An AEP® must have acquired extensive knowledge as an estate planner devoting at least a third of one's professional time to estate planning activities, including the accumulation, preservation, and distribution of assets through proper planning.

Experience ·

An AEP® must either: (1) have a minimum of five years of professional experience as an estate planner and have successfully completed two graduate courses in estate planning from The American College of Financial Services or from another accredited graduate program as part of a master's or doctoral degree; or (2) have a minimum of fifteen years of professional experience as an estate planning practitioner.

Ethical Commitment ·

An AEP® must sign a declaration agreeing to continuously abide by the NAEPC Code of Ethics and the Professional Responsibilities both of which embody the expected professional behavior of all designees.

Professional Reputation ·

An AEP® must certify that all designations and licenses are in good standing and must be recommended by three unrelated, credentialed professionals practicing within the disciplines recognized by the NAEPC.

Recognition of the Team Concept ·

An AEP® must acknowledge the highly complex nature of estate planning and seek to understand the interdependencies among the professionals on the team.

Affiliation ·

An AEP® must continuously maintain membership in an affiliated estate planning council to facilitate collaboration with members to enhance the profession and improve the quality of services to clients.

Continuing Education ·

An AEP® must complete at least 30 hours of continuing education every two years and certify this to the NAEPC on an annual basis. This requirement ensures that designation holders maintain a high level of expertise and remain current with the latest developments in estate planning.

Annual Audit ·

An AEP® must participate in the annual audit if selected to verify compliance with the core program requirements.
